PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Dear Memorial Parents,



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Welcome to the Memorial newsletter for 2021-2022. We have made it through the first month of school and are glad to see students have settled in well. Our new grade 10s seem like a great crew of kids to join our already wonderful 11s and 12s.

Belonging at Memorial is the big theme that we are undertaking this year. We are responding to societal events and directions to address issues like Truth and Reconciliation, racism, and homophobia to name a few topics. All of our teachers provided lessons on September 29 as part of National Truth and Reconciliation Day. This is an example of the big picture view of belonging but on a smaller scale, we also want all of our students to find their place in their school. The Rotary Interact students hosted the Club Fair on September 22 and 23 which was an opportunity for students to visit with members of the Rotary Interact, Let's Act Now, Anime Club, More than Just a Book Club, and the QSA as examples of groups they could join at Memorial. The growth in club membership was terrific!

We are also continuing our work with the Collaborative Response process which is a system where teachers work together to ensure that they have tools to support the learning of all students in their classes. This work is especially pertinent considering the varied learning experiences students have had over the past two years and the learning loss that has taken place for many. Torch Time is a big part of this process. I cannot emphasize enough the importance for parents to support their students by staying on top of their performance and checking PowerSchool regularly. This could be followed up by registering their kids in appropriate Torch Time sessions if needed. Reach out to teachers if you see something on PowerSchool that causes questions.

Finally, Covid is still a thing. I am so appreciative of the huge majority of students who are coming to school and following the expectations regarding masks and other protocols. While we are not fully back to pre-Covid operations we are certainly back to increased expectations with Diploma exams back on the table. If your student finds themselves in the unfortunate situation of being home for isolation it will be imperative that they follow along with google classroom if they are well enough. With the tight timelines of the quarter system, we can make some adjustments but this will be a challenge. Again, please check PowerSchool regularly to ensure your student is on top of their work to avoid too many problems should isolation occur.

2021-2022 is off to a marvelous start! Cross country running, football, and volleyball are all up and running. Apple day was a great way to start the day last week. The Club Fair connected a bunch of students to their like minded peers. Kids are coming to school and taking care of their business. So far so good! We are looking forward to a great school year!

TORCH TIME

IMPORTANT REMINDERS:

•Torch Time is mandatory on the first day of the week. That will usually be Mondays, but it will be Tuesdays if there is a long weekend. Students will remain in their afternoon classes for their Torch lesson.

•Students and the school are still accountable for the whereabouts of students until the end of the full school day. All students need to be signed up for a Torch Session everyday through PowerSchool. We will sign them up for their Monday/Tuesday session.

•On Tuesday we will be showing your kids how they can sign up using their phones or a computer. As high school students they have a lot of responsibility for their education, so we are giving them the tools to use their time accordingly.

•Parents and teachers can also sign up a student for a Torch Session. Students cannot unenroll from those sessions. There is a video below explaining to parents how they can sign their child up for a session.

•If a student is in good standing (meeting the expectations of their teachers, parents, and themselves) and have all of their assignments submitted to a passing level, they may use that time for a personal interest Torch Session (Open Gym, Fitness Training, etc.) or sign up to be Off Campus With Parent Approval. Students are also encouraged to sign up for academic sessions if they wish to improve their marks.

Go to https://mypass.alberta.ca and "Sign in With an Education Account". Students require their Alberta Student Number (which can be found on PowerSchool) and a personal email address. Do not use your psdblogs account because it will be deactivated when you graduate. Please stop by Student Services if you have questions or require assistance.

Post-Secondary Partnerships

Memorial students in Grade 12 have the opportunity to start their post-secondary journey early this year. Agreements have been made with several post-secondary institutions to take courses at no cost or minimal cost to students and their families. Students can take a large variety of courses in almost any area of study. The Institutions that are currently available are Olds College, Northern Lakes College, Athabasca University, Portage College, and Lakeland College. Other Institutions may come available later in the school year.

There are some pre-requisite requirements for these courses and it is important to set up a meeting with a counselor/grade coordinator to find out if a student is eligible. You can also set up a meeting with Mike Partington, the division coordinator who is at Memorial on Tuesdays. Check in with Mrs. Sorenson in Student Services to find out when you can book an appointment. If you are looking for an added challenge or just want to get a head start on your post-secondary learning, this might be the opportunity for you!


National Day for Truth and Reconciliation September 30





Previous MCHS Student selected for summit

U of A student selected for summit

Stony Plain teen one of two from Canada chosen to take part in ag conference

A Stony Plain teen is one of just two Canadians participating in the 2021 Bayer's Youth Ag Summit (YAS). The summit welcomes 100 dele-

gates, aged 18-25, every two years and this year's delegates come from more than 44 different countries.

Amanda Hardman, 19, is entering her second year at the University of Alberta and is studying sustainable agriculture. She said she knows her studies address a real-world problem and it's something that affects everyone. She said she's excited to learn more at YAS when the delegates first meet this November.

"It's going to be an amazing learning experience and I'm ready to soak it all in and take away as much as possible," Hardman told Postmedia. Hardman said a lot of her projects have focused on improving the food system and limiting waste, so when she heard about the summit she knew it was a good fit for her and submitted an application immediately

mediately. More than 2,000 youth from nearly 100 countries applied for

the Bayer's summit. Bayer Spokesperson Komle Hossini said applicantis answer questions about their experience and motivation for why they want to attend the summit and submit a three-minute video pitch explaining their project idea fitting the summit's theme of "Feeding a Hungry Planet."

Hossini said each country has its own jury that goes through applicants and grades them on a provided criteria which leads to the delegate selections.

Emily Robb from Brandon, Man., is the second Canadian taking part in the summit.

Hardman's project focused on finding an alternative to plastic clamshell packaging. The product she was working on used lettuce, she said, although other produce such as tomatoes could be used as well.

"Going through grocery stores, there's a lot of plastic packaging and a lot of it is needless," said Hardman. "Plastic clamshells are gettingbanned in places, so people are trying to come up with other types of food packaging and it's not really effective. So my whole thing was if I can improve this, make it a little more sustainable, then I want to do that."

Hardman said her project used a prototype made of sugarcane fibre sprayed with cellular nano crystals coming from wood pulp.

VIRTUAL SUMMIT

The pandemic forced YAS to go virtual for the first time this year and it will also be the first summit with YAS University – a program that allows delegates to complete weekly assignments that help with their individual project concept for 10 weeks following the summit beginning in January.

beginning in January. "It's going to be interesting, we're going to be learning a lot from industry professionals from across the world, so I am really looking forward to that," said Hardman.

Hossini said delegates would usually spend a week together working side-by-side on professional development and hear from speakers.

Bayer recognizes the importance of getting youth involved in agriculture careers, he added.

"This is a massive global problem where youth coming in at this age in the Youth Ag Summit, they're the ones that have the opportunity to tackle it and in all honesty, in 2050 they're going to be the ones tackling that problem," said Hossini.

"There are opportunities in ag and there will be far more jobs than we can possibly fill, so I want youth to take a look at agriculture for their future." *ktaniauch@sostmedia.com*

While many students stuck close to home this summer doing the things they usually do, Hunter went on a deeply personal adventure. He spent six weeks at CAF Camp Wainwright experiencing both cultural teachings and developing career skills. He is a proud graduate of the <u>CAF Bold Eagle Program</u>.

The first week of Bold Eagle was culturally based under the guidance of elders. There was daily ceremony and prayer. Hunter was gifted his second spirit name *Cetan Maza* which means Iron Hawk. His first spirit name is Cree, *Kihiw Napew,* meaning Eagle Man given to him by his elders. Clearly Hunter has strength and vision. He is confident in the spirits watching over him and as a result of his experience with the elders this summer feels a deeper family connection.

The Armed Forces training became the focus in week two. Hunter's first comment is that it was stressful. They were up at 5am every morning and didn't get to bed until at least 11pm every evening. There was at least three hours of daily PT (physical training). Hunter very much enjoyed the rifle handling. The instructors were very strict throughout the program but kind after the work was done.

He loved the Bold Eagle Program and Hunter is planning on joining the infantry upon completion of high school in January.
